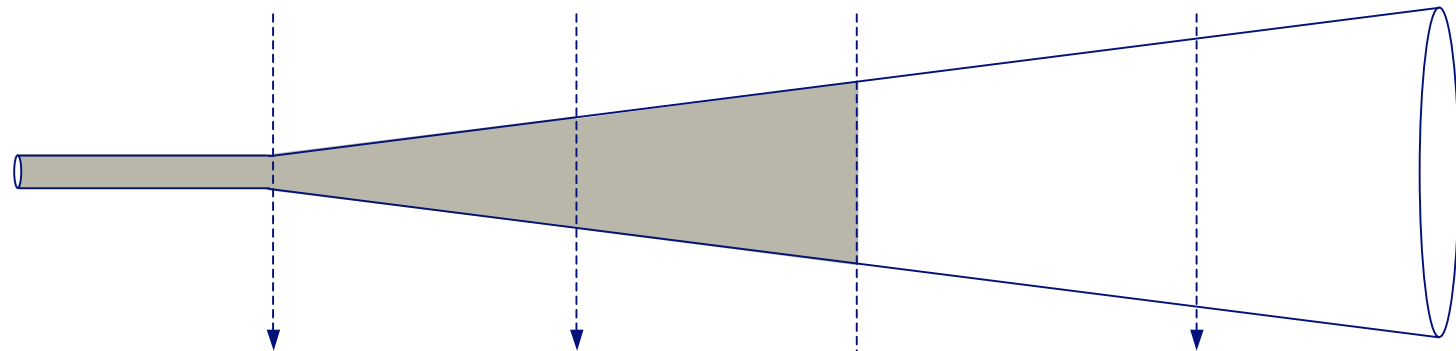


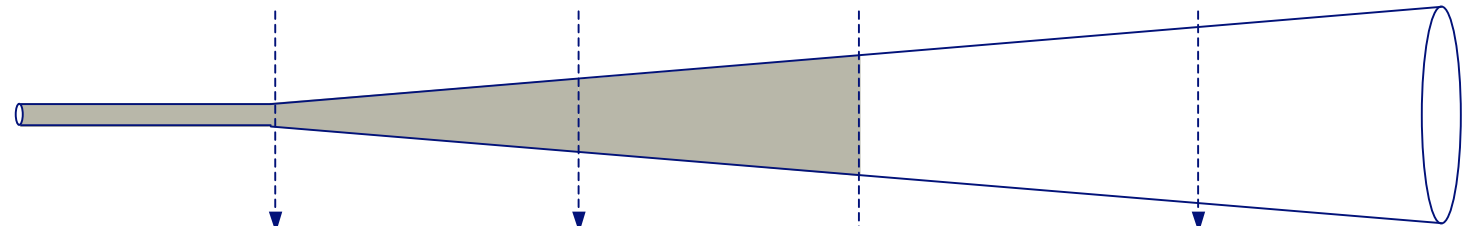
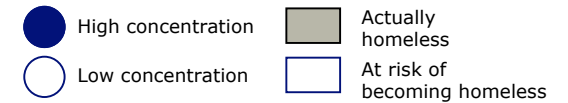
Over the course of each year 750-1,000 Evanstonians experience homelessness, and another 3,000+ are at risk

Population description	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Individuals who persistently find themselves living on the street (sleeping on park benches or sidewalks, or "squatting" one night at a time), and (for various reasons) spend much of the year unsheltered Typically from the chronically homeless population 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Housed in homeless shelters or other institutions or nursing homes intended for temporary stay, with no arrangement for subsequent stable housing 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> "Doubled-up" (i.e., living with family or friends), but with no stable housing 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Victims of domestic violence Recently separated or divorced low-income women Individuals recently leased from institutions (e.g., prisons or mental institutions) Disowned/disenfranchised youth, and transitioning at-risk youth Immigrants without work visas (and their families); also families of (already or soon-to-be) deported undocumented immigrants 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Individuals/families in financial crisis (e.g., job loss) or financially adverse life event (e.g., serious injury leading to loss of income stream) Individuals/families with persistent financial concerns (including those on fixed income) Individuals/families facing imminent eviction or foreclosure, or paying an excessively high portion of income ($\geq 30\%$) for rent/mortgage

- Historical approaches have emphasized charity: handouts, soup kitchens and shelters
- Our approach is based on empowerment: helping individuals become contributing members of society

 - By the CoC at current funding levels
 - By the CoC with significantly additional levels of funding
 - With meaningful support from the City government
 - With policy changes and support from the State Government
 - With policy changes and support from the Federal Government
